

# “A Century of Honor”

## Frequently Asked Questions about the Broadcast

---

**Q. The scheduled time for the live broadcast is not convenient in our area. Are there other times or ways we can watch the broadcast?**

- A. In addition to the live broadcast on Tuesday, October 29, from 7:00 to 8:15 p.m. mountain daylight time, “A Century of Honor” will be rebroadcast that same evening at 9:00 p.m. and again on Wednesday, October 30, at 5:00 p.m.

You could also record the broadcast from the satellite feed or download it from [scouts100.lds.org](http://scouts100.lds.org) and show it at a time that is convenient for you.

**Q. When will the broadcast be available on the Internet?**

- A. “A Century of Honor” broadcast will be streamed live on [scouts100.ld.org](http://scouts100.ld.org) and within 24 hours of the live broadcast will be available as a downloadable video file.

**Q. How do we record the broadcast?**

- A. For LDS Church-affiliated groups, the stake technology specialist should be able to help with recording. He or she may need to contact the local facilities management group to obtain the right equipment. Other groups or organizations should feel welcome to ask the nearest LDS Church group for a copy of the recording, or they may consider the downloadable video file on [scouts100.lds.org](http://scouts100.lds.org) as another way to obtain their own copy.

**Q. In what languages and formats will the broadcast be made available?**

- A. English video and audio-only files will be available at [scouts100.lds.org](http://scouts100.lds.org) within 24 hours of the live broadcast. Spanish video and audio-only files will be available by November 1, 2013. English video files with subtitles for the hearing impaired will also be available by November 1, 2013.

**Q. Will there be a flag ceremony, or should we do our own before the broadcast begins?**

- A. At the beginning of the broadcast, there will be a color guard and flag ceremony in which everyone can participate. The ceremony will include only the American flag and the BSA flag. There will be an opening prayer at the beginning of the broadcast.

**Q. If we don't want to show the full 75-minute program, is there an easy way to show only selected portions?**

- A. It is recommend that you show the entire program. However, separate portions of the program will be available for download on [scouts100.lds.org](http://scouts100.lds.org) after the live event.

**Q. What resources are available for us to promote the event in our area?**

- A. Many resources are available on [scouts100.lds.org](http://scouts100.lds.org).

**Q. Who is invited to view “A Century of Honor”?**

- A. Current and former Scouts, leaders, friends, and families from all Scouting units in your community should especially be invited. In addition, all interested people in your community are also welcome to attend.

**Q. What is the focus of “A Century of Honor”? Is it primarily about Scouting or the LDS Church?**

- A. “A Century of Honor” is a tribute to Scouting. It focuses on its history, as well as the virtues and values of Scouting shared by all chartered partners.

**Q. What activities should we plan in connection with the broadcast?**

- A. Work with local BSA executives and Scout leaders from other chartered partners to decide what is best for your area. Ideas may include activities such as a multidenominational food drive, an open house featuring displays from various local Scout units, dinner prepared by Scouts, and skills competitions, to name a few.
